Letter from the President By LTG (Ret.) Ron Watts



A happy, healthy, greeting to all of our ~ 9,500 Society members. Your Society is financially healthy, and working to support our members and active-duty BRO soldiers.

Major General Monté L. Rone: A special welcome to our new Commanding General of the 1st Infantry Division. MG Rone has served in Airborne, Mechanized/Armor, and Stryker formations. His most recent assignment was Commandant of the United States Army Infantry School, Fort Moore (formerly Fort Benning) GA. His bio is included in this edition of the <u>BHS</u>.

First Division Monument Expansion: We completed the addition of the 631 names of BRO soldiers killed in Post 9-11 operations (Afghanistan: 192; Iraq: 439); replaced the DESERT STORM plaque with one that conforms to other plaques; and installed Granite plinths that could be used to hold the names of BRO KIAs in future wars. Thank you, McCormick Foundation, for the \$500,000 grant, and 50 cents matching for every dollar donated. Also, thanks to all our members and sponsors for their generous financial contributions! *No debt remains!*

2025 Society Reunion: We have started planning for our 2025 Reunion in the Chicago area. Thanks to the McCormick Foundation's generous financial commitments, we will be able to provide our members a relatively

inexpensive reunion. The center piece of events will be the Cantigny Museum and Cantigny Park. Please look at initial details in this **BHS**; mark your calendars and tell your friends. I would love to see you at the Reunion <u>18 – 21 June 2025</u>. Support to BRO Active-Duty Soldiers: The SFID has donated for the last several years \$50.00 Commissary Gift Cards at Thanksgiving and Christmas to BRO soldiers and their families needing food assistance. The Division Chaplain has identified a need for 26 of these gift cards each month. Thanks to a generous McCormick Foundation Grant, starting in September 2024, we provide 26 x \$50.00 commissary gift cards each month for distribution to soldiers and their families identified by the Division chaplains. We will also provide an addition 26 at Thanksgiving and 26 at Christmas. We hope to continue this program in 2025.

Huebner Scholarships: These are competitive scholarships for children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren of former members who have served in the First Infantry Division. As well as children of active-duty soldiers of the division, and attached units of the 1st Infantry Division. I need your help in spreading the word that we want to help <u>eligibles attend Trade School</u>, and College. Details for 2025 will soon be on the Society webpage.

Post 9 – 11 BRO Veterans: Finally,

your SFID Board of Directors approved a plan to start moving Society leadership positions to post 9 - 11 BRO veterans. Walking the Path of Others



CARENTAN, France - It is difficult to describe the great weight hanging over the National American Cemetery on the bluffs of Colleville-ser-mer overlooking Omaha Beach, where Soldiers of the 1st Infantry Division landed eighty years ago.

A calm exists here. The sound of the waves below, the birds and the wind, like whispers from the souls who were there laid to rest; those who fought along the beaches, through the draws and up the hills. It is not the sounds of silence, but of the endless rhythm of time, of the natural world now at peace because of those who fought and died there.

Soldiers of today serving in the 1st Inf. Div. traveled to Normandy, France, during the 80th Anniversary of D-Day in order to gain a better understanding of the unit's history and the weight now permanent in the sand and soil of Europe.

"There's no difference between the Soldiers of today and the ones in that cemetery because they all volunteered to serve," said Maj. Gen. John V. Meyer III, commander of the 1st Inf. Div. These Soldiers, who were invited to Normandy because of their accomplishments, traveled along the beaches and bluffs overlooking Omaha, they stood in the same tide where Soldiers, much like them, assaulted the beach below. They felt with their hands the places where ordinance had ripped apart the earth and where bullets drove themselves into the walls of concrete bunkers after having found their mark.

During a tour led by Col. (ret.) Paul Herbert, a historian and veteran of the 1st Inf. Div., the Soldiers heard stories of some of those who landed on the beaches 80 years ago. They asked questions, eager to know more about those ordinary people tasked to accomplish extraordinary things. They learned of Cpt. John M. Spalding, whose actions helped clear German defenses allowing for Allied troops to get off the beaches and move further inland; Lt. Jimmie W. Monteith, a draftee whose gallant efforts to direct fire towards enemy combatants before being killed in action earned him the Medal of Honor: Pvt. Charles N.

Shay, a combat medic who landed with the first waves at Omaha, saved the lives of 20 Soldiers and earned the Silver Star for his heroic actions that day; and many others who wore the Big Red One patch on their shoulders.

"The life I've lived, the freedom I've had, the opportunity I've had, the prosperity I've enjoyed, everything that is good about my life is in some way derivative of the fact that we did not lose WWII," said Herbert. "Know this history, because particularly for those fellas that wear a Big Red One patch on your shoulder, or a Screaming Eagle, or an All-American, or an Ivy, or whatever the outfit is that served here or elsewhere, you've inherited a hell of a legacy. These guys set the standard. This is what we're living up to. When we walk around with that patch on our shoulder, that's what it means."

Prior to Operation Overlord and the Allied invasion of Normandy the Nazi war machine had cleared the bluffs adjacent to the beaches of Normandy entirely. They removed all the trees and vegetation, killing as much of the natural landscape as possible in order to build their Atlantic Wall. These efforts created the perfect landscape for German troops manning machine gun nests and artillery emplacements to capitalize on uninhibited fields of fire.

"It's incredible to hear what [they] were able to accomplish," said 1st Lt. John Pezzolanti, an engineer officer serving in the 1st Engineer Battalion, 1st Inf. Div. "How fortified this area was and what they went through it's just amazing what they were able to accomplish. Thinking about what it would have been like to do it; I can't even put myself in their footsteps. It's really remarkable."

Landings began soon after 6:00 a.m., just as the sun began to present itself over Europe to the east. In the ensuing minutes, Allied forces braved a maelstrom of German fire taking thousands of casualties in the first few hours alone. Despite the German efforts, this "impenetrable" wall was breached in a single day due to the efforts of a massive Allied force with a singular mission; to liberate France and enact the beginning of the end of Hitler's regime.

Estimates suggest that nearly 160,000 Allied troops landed on the beaches of Normandy on June 6, 1944, a small fraction of the more than two million soldiers, sailors, pilots, medics and others from dozens of countries supporting the invasion effort elsewhere.

"The Soldiers who fought here, and especially the Soldiers who died here saved the world from Hilter's vision and from what the world might have been had he won the war," said Herbert. "Everyone of us that is alive today owes them because we've grown up in a freer and more prosperous world because of what the Soldiers did here."

Of the 4,414 Allied troops killed on D-Day, 2,501 were American. Between June 6 and July 24, 1944, the 1st Inf. Div. lost 657 Soldiers. Their names are etched in the stone on a monument overlooking the beach taken by the Big Red One during the conjoined effort to liberate France and the rest of Europe. By the end of the Second World War the 1st Inf. Div. had lost 5,516 Soldiers.

Reflecting on those losses, Soldiers serving with the 1st Inf. Div. visited these sites alongside other military service members from across the United States and the world. Between ceremonies hosted by the Big Red One were others conducted by Soldiers of the British, Belgium, Canadian, Dutch, French, and German armies all taking moments to memorialize the same events and the people who participated in them.

"The French do an incredibly good job of preserving these historic sites and preserving the legacy of D-Day and the importance of D-Day," said Herbert.

Today, these sites, once plagued by some of the most horrific acts of combat ever recorded, are now known in French





as a, "site naturel protege," land protected for its natural biodiversity and beauty. Places as diverse as people who landed upon them eighty years ago; a place no longer vibrating to the sounds of bullets, artillery and war, but to the sounds of the waves, the wind, the birds and the quiet calm of peace these souls earned.

Approximately 180 veterans who served in the Second World War attended celebrations across Normandy during the 80th Anniversary of D-Day. As the months and years go by and as with all living things these veterans will move on to the next, taking with them their vivid recollections of the events they experienced first hand.

The veterans living and dead, adorned and celebrated by the French and world alike, are owed a magnificent debt, one that can only be paid by the sharing of their stories, so that the world might never know such horrors again.

Big Red One Welcomes New Leader

FORT RILEY, Kan. -- The 1st Infantry Division and Fort Riley hosted a division change of command ceremony at Cavalry Parade Field, Fort Riley, Kansas, June 27, 2024.

U.S. Army Lt. Gen. Sean C. Bernabe, commanding general of the III Armored Corps and Fort Cavazos, presided over the change of command ceremony held to honor Maj. Gen. John V. Meyer, III, the division's outgoing commanding general, and to welcome Maj. Gen. Monté L. Rone, the division's incoming commanding general.

The change of command ceremony is a military tradition representing a handover of authorities and responsibilities within a unit or command. The colors flown at every ceremony represent the history, tradition, and accomplishments of a unit throughout its history. The passing of the colors signifies more than a change in power and authority, it signifies a new chapter for the division in its long history of service to the nation and the American people it has sworn to defend.

Meyer, who assumed command of the 1st Inf. Div. and Fort Riley in May of 2022, expressed his appreciation of the Soldiers in formation and the importance of the oath taken and upheld by all Soldiers.

"We often talk about that Soldiers take an oath and serve something larger than themselves without ever articulating what that something is," said Meyer. "That something that these Soldiers standing in front of you took an oath to, are the ideals of our country, contained in the constitution. They have raised their right hand and vowed to support and defend those ideas and all of them give us hope that tomorrow will be better than today. So, to all those Soldiers who have served with me these past 25 months, thank you."

Meyer has proudly served the 1st Inf. Div. for over two years and expressed confidence and appreciation for the incoming commanding general and his family. Meyer will move forward as the Chief of Staff at United States Northern Command, at Peterson Space Force Base, Colorado.

"Now as we bid farewell to team Meyer, we are welcoming a fantastic team in Monté and Michelle Rone," said Bernabe. "Monté is coming to us from the Maneuvers Center of Excellence, where he was the commandant of the U.S. Army Infantry School. I'll tell you, he is a leader with a reputation of excellence."

Maj. Gen. Rone was commissioned in the Infantry upon graduation from Eastern Michigan University in 1995. Rone has served in Airborne, Mechanized/ Armor, and Stryker formations. His first assignment was with the 3rd Battalion, 505th Parachute Infantry Regiment in the 82nd Airborne Division at Fort Bragg, North Carolina.

"My family and I are humbled and grateful to Army senior leaders for allowing us and entrusting us with command of the 1st Inf. Div. and Fort Riley," said Rone. At the Front of the Fight: The 745th Tank Battalion, Summer 1944

The Initial Landings:

Officially attached to the Division in April, the landing on Omaha beach and the subsequent fighting in the weeks after were the Battalion's first combat experiences.¹ The order was given for the Landing Ship Dock HMS Oceanway to begin unloading the 20 LCMs loaded with Company B's tanks.² This was unique, as they were the only Allied tanks landed using LCMs. The rest of the battalion was brought in using LSTs on June 7th.³ The battalion suffered its first casualties on Omaha Beach with Charles Donoghue, a tank commander in Company B, being the first man killed.⁴ Donoghue wasn't the last, as Company

C lost an entire tank crew the

next day when German Panzerfaust weapons detonated ammunition in SSgt. William E. Hinton's tank.⁵

Fighting in the Hedgerows:

The 745th played a crucial role in the Division's operations, holding an important distinction amongst units in Normandy. The 745th, and the accompanying infantry were the furthest South units of the Allied Expeditionary Force. After five days of constant attacks, they arrived at the La Vacquerie-Caumont highway. Alongside the 26th Infantry Regiment, the tankers linked up with the British 50th Infantry Division that landed at Gold Beach.7 By linking up the two beachheads, the 745th had assisted strengthening the Allied

position in Normandy. Company B was also involved in taking two important towns, specifically Hamel and Formigny located less than three miles inland of Omaha Beach.⁸ Taking these towns greatly improved the Division's hold on the beachhead. The 745th support gave the infantry advantages over the Germans, however, the hedgerows were a major obstacle for the tanks. As Eddie Ireland put it, "we'd have to hunt for an opening to get through, because some of our tanks that tried to make the hedgerow, they would turn over ... and also they would expose the tank to fire."9

Operation Cobra:

The 745th had been taken off the front line to prepare

for Operation Cobra, training and re-equip themselves for the Normandy breakout. This included the testing of the Rhino attachment used for breaking through the hedgerows. The tankers performed these tests with Major Gen. Huebner, the Division's CG, present¹⁰ and they found that the attachment required further reinforcement in certain areas.11 The 745th fought its way to Marigny alongside the 18th Infantry Regiment and 3rd Armored Division's Combat Command B,¹² with Company C cutting off German troops from escaping at Coutances.¹³ Lt. Col. Wallace Nichols, the Battalion's CO, noted in the After-Action Reports that mounting 1st Division soldiers on the tanks was immensely successful.¹⁴ This provided greater mobility to the infantry, as they could move and deploy into battle faster with greater coordination with the tanks. July 28th saw Company A engage German Armor, destroying two Panther tanks, suffering only light losses with four M4s temporarily knocked out.¹⁵ Captain Leonard S. Wilds of Company D was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross for his actions in this engagement.16

Outside of Mons:

Lt. Col. Nichols was the 745th's first member to enter the town of Maubeuge, coordinating with the 16th Infantry Regiment's CO to respond to the large German force amassed about 500 yards from their location.¹⁷ Company A, attached to the 16th, were the first tanks to confront the Germans. The tankers and infantry worked together, along with the 3rd Armored Division, to destroy five German divisions, taking 25,000 prisoners in two days. General Huebner noted the tanks with the 26th Infantry

Regiment assisted in destroying a major German column, destroying enemy tanks and vehicles, until 3rd Battalion called in an air mission to strike it.¹⁸ The 745th was again at the forefront of the Division's actions, providing support and participating in the destruction of the German divisions retreating to defend the German border.

Conclusion:

The 745th continued its service with the 1st Infantry Division for the rest of the war, being the only Separate Tank Battalion to be permanently attached to a division during World War II.¹⁹ Their attachment to the Division has continued into the present as the 63rd Armored Regiment. The actions of the 745th during the summer of 1944 had a direct impact on the war effort, as they were always involved in the critical operations.

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In Memoriam

Major General Josue Robles, Jr (Ret), 1946-2024

Major General (Retired) Josue "Joe" Robles passed away on July 4, 2024, at the age of 78. MG Robles commanded the 1st Infantry Division (Mechanized) and Fort Riley from July 1993 until June 1994. He was the 52nd Commanding General of the Big Red One.

MG Roble's also served in the 1st Infantry Division as special assistant to the G-3 (Operations); Battalion Commander, 1st Battalion, 7th Field Artillery; and as the Division Artillery Commander from 1986-1988. Gen. Robles' military awards included the Distinguished Service Medal, the Legion of Merit with two Oak Leaf Clusters (OLC), the Bronze Star Medal (OLC), the Meritorious Service Medal (OLC), the Air Medal, and the Army Commendation Medal (OLC).

In June 1994 MG Robles retired to El Paso, Texas, and became CEO of USAA.

Repatriation of Soldier from the 1st Division 105 Years Later

In late January of 2020, Anthony Hewitt from the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency (DPAA) sent a message to our Research Historian, Andrew Woods, in the Robert R. McCormick Research Center (MRC) at Cantigny Park in Wheaton, Illinois, concerning a World War I citation for Eugene McAllister. Andrew passed the inquiry to me for further research. In searching the Company "I" 26th Infantry rosters on our Digital Archives, I found that two soldiers had been sent to the 1st Division, with their names in alphabetical order. Both men had come over together in Company "C" of the 161st Infantry, 41st Division. Private Charles McAllister 75396 and Eugene McAuliffe 75264 were sent to the 1st Division from the 41st Replacement Depot Division on June 18, 1918 per Regimental Special Order 108. On 31 July 1918, Private Eugene McAllister 75264 was listed as "Missing in Action".

Using Ancestry.com to search for the names led to Family Trees on the site for each of the men. Eugene Owen McAuliffe was born in Ireland in 1892. His WW II Draft Card from 1942 has the remark, "Shot thru sholder of Left Arm". He died in San Francisco, California in 1969.

On Charles McAllister's Family Tree, Charles was born in Wisconsin in 1893 and is Missing in Action 19 July 1918. Upon collecting all of the information available on Charles, through our Digital Archives, Ancestry.com, Fold3.com, and the National Archives Digitized Records, his military and personal service was followed through the years. The information was sent to the moderator of the Charles McAllister Family Tree on Ancestry.com., Beverly Dillon. We received a thank you and also a reply stating his remains were found on the Soissons Battlefield in France by French Archaeologists in 2004, and then shipped to Hawaii to DPAA. France requires an archaeological survey of any building activity on any of its sensitive historical sites.

Prior to our email conversation in 2020, Beverly Dillon had been in contact with DPAA and had sent them her and also her son's DNA to help make identification. We again contacted Beverly in September 2021 to find out the progress of identification, but there was no new progress.

In the fall of 2024, Beverly contacted us and mentioned she had successfully contacted her Congressman. He put her in contact with DPAA, and they finally explained the need for MALE family line DNA for the identification. She was also put in touch, within 48 hours, with the Army Human Resources Command at Fort Knox, Kentucky. Beverly had done the male side of the family tree, as well as her side (her ancestor was Charles' sister) The Army and Beverly went through her research on the male line for Charles. They found a line that stretched four generations. A distant cousin's DNA was received, processed and a positive linking identification was made. Due to the Research at the McCormick Research Center, Charles' designated next of kin received the WW I Victory Medal, Purple Heart and Silver Star.

When the Alaska Airlines Honor Flight with Charles' remains arrived from Hawaii, 45 relatives, who had never previously met each other, were there at the airport for the arrival of his remains. On August 21, 2024, he was buried with full military honors at the Acacia Cemetery in Seattle, Washington, 106 years after his death at Soissons. Over 50 people attended the burial. In addition to Charles' great nephew receiving a burial flag, the family decided Beverly should also receive a flag for all of her efforts to bring Charles home. The burial service included information about Charles' military service from the research done at the First Division Museum's MRC at Cantigny Park in Wheaton, Illinois. Copies of the all the research, were given to all people attending the burial.

Recently, Beverly wrote in a note thanking those involved in researching Charles McAllister, "The information you have sent me in the last 4 years has helped me to understand the circumstances of his time in the Army. Equally important, it has shown him as a real person, well identified and moving through life during an exceptionally tragic time of war. While his remains were pretty much just a box of unidentified bones to DPAA, real life mentions of his time in the Army helped me see him as a real person, not a fictional character that may or may not have been a real person, distantly related to me at that!"

First Division Monument Expansion Dedication





WASHINGTON D.C. — 1st Infantry Division Soldiers supported the Society of the First Infantry Division (SOFID) by participating in the First Infantry Division Monument Expansion Dedication Ceremony, May 26, 2024 in President's Park, Washington, D.C.

To mark the 100th Anniversary of the First Infantry Division Monument, the 1st Inf. Div. honored 631 Big Red One Soldiers killed in Afghanistan and Iraq and unveiled a new Desert Storm plaque containing the names of the 1st Inf. Div. Soldiers killed in Operation Desert Storm. U.S. Army Lt. Gen. (Ret.) Ron Watts, 47th commanding general of the 1st Inf. Div. and current president of the SOFID, shared a brief history of the monument, the new features that make up the expansion, and sympathized with the families in attendance.

"Today we continue the proud heritage of the First Division Monument. To your front are the granite plinths with name plaques, containing the names of the 631 Soldiers killed in action: 439 killed in Iraq and 192 killed in Afghanistan," Watts said. "We mourn your [Gold Star Families'] loss and pray that you find comfort in the memories of your loved ones, whom we honor here today. They made the ultimate sacrifice while serving with the 1st Inf. Div."

U.S. Senator Roger Marshall, who supported the SOFID with their monument expansion project, joined the Kansas Gold Star Families, Big Red One Soldiers, and veterans in the celebration.

"Today we honor the lives of our heroes and humbly add their names to the First Division Monument. These warriors' names now join the 12, 947 1st Inf. Div. Soldiers who preceded them, each of them too having made the last full measure of devotion," Marshall said. "Our national anthem concludes with a question not a statement: 'Oh say, does that Star Spangled Banner yet wave?'," Marshall said. "The lives of the 631 Soldiers we honor today answer a resounding, 'Yes.'" Maj. Gen. John V, Meyer III, the 1st Inf. Div. commanding general, delivered remarks on the division's legacy throughout the past century, and thanked the families for their loved one's sacrifice.

"For 107 years this division, the First Division, has defended the values that make our country great." Meyer said. "I'd like to thank all of the family members for coming here today and all of the Soldiers you represent with your presence here today. We honor your sacrifice and we stand in remembrance. No mission too difficult, no sacrifice too great. Duty first."

Gold Star Spouse, Sierra Herring, spoke about her late husband, U.S. Army Spc. Josph Lister, who died on November 20, 2003 from an improvised explosive device in Iraq. While sharing her personal story about loss and resilience, she emphasized the importance of remembering fallen Soldiers.

"The monument and adding Spc. Josph's name and adding the Gold Star Families Soldier's names to the monument, means that their legacy will live on," Herring said. "People will see his name and be able to find out who he is, that means that you all have guaranteed that Joe will be able to live on forever. People will be able to talk about him, they will look him up and know his story."

All attention turned to the new granite plinths as the removal of the black cloths unveiled bronze plaques containing the name, rank, and unit of the Soldiers killed in action from Desert Storm, Operation Iraqi Freedom, Operation New Dawn, and Operation Enduring Freedom.

Veterans, friends, Families and Big Red One Soldiers interacted and embraced each other following the conclusion of the ceremony. A mix of emotions could be seen as they remembered their loved ones and searched for their names on the newly unveiled plaques.

The 1st Inf. Div. and the SOFID will continue to recognize past, current and future Big Red One Soldiers for their dedication and selfless service and remember the fallen Soldiers who paid the ultimate sacrifice defending the nation.

Documentary Film – Vietnam War

The Atlanta Vietnam Veterans Business Association Foundation is proud to present a 47-minute documentary film entitled "Truths and Myths About the Vietnam War" with introduction by actor Sam Elliott. The purpose of the film is to honor those who served in the Vietnam War by providing factual information to address the decades of misinformation that have presented a skewed historical perspective of the war – a very important and long overdue film that presents the information and lessons learned that most Vietnam War veterans want reported about the war. Some of the truth we now know comes from Vietcong and North Vietnamese archives and other disclosures made available over the last 50 years since the war ended.

The film features Medal of Honor recipient Patrick H. Brady and 7 historians including 5 of the 6 historians featured on the Fox Nation documentary films entitled "The Unauthorized History of the Vietnam War" moderated by Bret Baier – and 2 of the 7 historians are Distinguished Fellows at the University of Virginia School of Law.

The film has been seen by a large number of veterans of the war and generated considerable enthusiasm – many consider the film to be the

best ever produced about the war.

We are a very credible veteran organization and were recently made honorary partners with the Vietnam War Commemoration Office at the Department of Defense. The film was shown at the National Infantry Museum on March 29 - National Vietnam Veterans Day - and Georgia Public Broadcasting on May 27 - Memorial Day.
