This is great news as we move the Society to the next Chapter in our heritage. Just as the Vietnam Vets did when the WWII Vets started to leave us, the Society looks forward to the leadership of the Post 9-11 BRO Veterans. However, speaking on behalf of all the Vietnam-era BRO Vets, we have no plans to fade away soon!

2022 Society Reunion: WE ARE GOING TO HAVE A BIG REUNION

IN FORT WORTH, TEXAS, 20-24 JULY 2022! Planning is underway for a great event. Please mark your calendars and watch for further details from our Executive Director. Look forward to lots of "family catching up" since our last reunion in Baltimore, in 2019.

D.C. Monument Status: We are making progress to add the 631 names of BRO Soldiers lost in Post 9-11 operations (Afghanistan: 192; Iraq: 439) to the First Infantry Division D.C. Monument. LTG Rhame leads our efforts to obtain National Park Service (NPS) approval to start construction. LTG Rhame presented Society plans to NPS on 5 October 2021. After NPS approves our concept plans, we will submit for NPS approval

the detailed construction plan. We anticipate NPS final approval by Spring 2022. We estimate a need for about \$400,000 to make the necessary modifications. As of 30 September 2021, we had \$256,000 in the bank. Your continued donations are appreciated.

Society Chapters: I thank members who have stepped forward to start a Society Chapter in their area. Local chapters offer opportunities for more involvement by our members. Positives that I see include improved community relations between state and local officials; possible assistance to BRO Vets in need of assistance; and opportunities to inform local citizens of First

Infantry Division operations.

Letter from the Executive Director By CW3 (Ret) Phyllis Fitzgerald

Greetings everyone! I hope this letter finds you well and staying healthy. It's cooling off in Kansas – a great time of the year with the leaves changing colors, frosty mornings, and the wearing of hoodies (available in our quartermaster).

We have been busy at Society headquarters, working on the database, mailing out quarter-master orders, assisting Veterans via phone calls or email, and promoting the Society. Every opportunity we get, we will set up at events on Fort Riley and in our communities and share with the Soldiers, Veterans, families, and our community what the Society of the First Infantry is and our mission. In the magazine you will see some pictures and notes about our activities.

Last summer, like most folks, we learned that USPS postal rates went up 6.9% in August and in October USPS temporarily raised shipping rates for packages during the holidays. The increase

Greetings from Fort Riley!

I hope this finds you all well and prepared for the winter! As we settle in for the season our units continue to accomplish great things at home and abroad. In the States, the Sustainment Brigade and one of Fort Riley's tenant units, 300th MP Company, are a vital part of welcoming and integrating our Afghan partners with Operation Allies Welcome. Throughout this mission, the Durable command team at Philadelphia Airport and the 300th MP Company at Camp Atterbury, worked around the clock to ensure the safety and security of our partners. Society of the First Infantry Division Chapter Meeting

On September 23, 2021, after 18 months of not meeting, we were able to have a chapter meeting. The meeting was well attended with over two dozen present.

Our Society President, General Watts, spoke to the chapter via Zoom. He discussed membership numbers, the fact that Post 9-11 BRO Veterans members now outnumber Vietnam-era Veterans, budget, the need to form chapters, Big Red One Support Fund, and thanked everyone for their service and time.

Our meeting was streamed live on our Society of the First Infantry Division Facebook page. You can watch and/or listen to the meeting at the following link: https://www.facebook.com/ SocietyFirstInfantryDivision/ videos/386144742964476 (you do not need an account to do this).

Our guest speaker was Former Army Sgt. Robert K. DeBolt III (Mike). Mike received the Distinguished Service Cross, the second highest valor decoration awarded for extreme gallantry and risk of life in actual combat with an armed enemy force. He was assigned to 2nd Battalion, 2nd Infantry Regiment, 3rd Brigade Combat Team/1st Infantry Division. Mike deployed to Operation Enduring Freedom in 2008. After his vehicle struck an improvised explosive device and became engulfed in flames, Mike, a Private

at the time, extracted himself and extinguished the flames covering more than half of his body. Realizing his teammates were still trapped inside the burning wreckage and ignoring his own extensive wounds and the continued enemy small arms and rocket propelled grenade fire directed at his vehicle, he helped pull his fellow Soldiers from the vehicle to safety while extinguishing their burning clothing. His actions helped save the life of one fellow Soldier while helping prevent serious injury to another.

Mike told the Chapter that once he recovered from his injuries (9 months later) he had the option to depart the military but chose to stay and redeploy to Afghanistan a second time. He believes this second deployment gave him closure. He felt that he had left a piece of himself behind there and was able to get it back with the second deployment.


Mike did not want to talk a lot about himself, but about his Soldiers and their acts of bravery on that awful day.

Many questions and comments were asked and shared by those attending the meeting. In attendance was life member George Bowman who also served during Vietnam in the same battalion and regiment (2nd Battalion, 2nd Infantry Regiment, 1st Brigade, 1st Infantry Division). George shared experiences of his time in Vietnam.

Vietnam

"Mines and Men"

An excerpt from Edward Roby's "Heavy Metal: Memoir of a distant war," published in 2020.



Our usual daylight mission was to "search and destroy." Even this martial term of art conveyed a subtle admission that we seldom knew where the enemy was. But it often took on a more sardonic meaning for my mechanized infantrymen, the modern version of foot Soldiers on horseback.

We'd searched ever so diligently for the elusive Viet Cong (VC) until we "found" one of their land mines. That phase ends with a bang; a VC mine protests explosively when run over by an unwary 11-ton M-113 armored personnel carrier, called an A-Cav, APC, PC or just a track. Our S&D areas concealed hundreds of VC mines - improvised, hybrid, manufactured, small anti-personnel, big ant-tank, pressure-detonated or remotely trigger on cue with hidden wires. If we had enough men and tracks, I suppose we

could have found them all.

The most common scenario went like this: The disturbed land mine obligingly destroys itself, putting the unlucky tracked vehicle out of action with a broken hard rubber track shoe or mangled steel tread. The explosion simultaneously catapults a squad of Soldiers right off the top of the track. Arms or ribs occasionally fracture when land akimbo on the ground. The rest of the unit take up security positions, smoke cigarettes and wait.

The odds of a combat vehicle becoming an impromptu mine sweeper mimic Russian roulette. Given the routine risk of hitting mines, each track carries versatile maintenance tools and several sections of spare tread draped over the vehicles' frontal wooden trim-vanes. The typical jungle repair work – if no one was

badly hurt — would idle the whole column for about half an hour.

The daily hazard of buried, pressure-detonated land mines made the official acronym APC a bit of a misnomer. Trusting their own flak jackets instead, our Soldiers always perched precariously on top of their moving combat vehicles, never inside where the thoughtful manufacturer had provided fold-down canvas-covered benches to seat nine or ten men.

The track driver was the odd man out. He had his own interior throne in front of the steering laterals, pedals and engine controls. His exclusive compartment was capped by a heavy protective hatch cover, usually left wide open for good reason. A standard land mine, about the size and shape of a kid's birthday cake, might cause the

driver no more than headache if it detonated underneath a tread. But there were other kinds of mines capable of blasting him skyward like a Polaris missile leaving a silo – unless his skull smashed into a closed, armored hatch cover.

To one of those devilish others, I probably owed my own coveted command slot in the mechanized 2nd Battalion, 2nd Infantry Regiment – the 2/2 Infantry. The battalion was short two captains. An unexploded 8-inch artillery round re-jiggered as a blockbuster anti-tank mine and planted in the mechanized line of march had just killed a new commander of Bravo Company along with his track crew. That happened on September 14, 1967, ten days before a helicopter dropped me off at the battalion's field location overlooking the ruined hamlet of Ap Bo La on the

fringe of War Zone D.

Another new captain had already reported for duty a week before me. On the spot he was made the next commander of the unlucky unit. The battalion commander gave him a curt directive: "Bravo Company has a morale problem. Fix it." Decades after the unforgettable mine incident at a notorious road intersection dubbed Claymore Corners, Company B's veterans still shared vivid memories of how the September 14 blast had changed their perception of buried risks.

"Our track #221 was at the head of the column. Myself and three others were assigned to mine-sweep the raised section of roadway... not long after Captain Rose's PC was blown," one Soldier wrote in an exchange on his unit's veterans forum with the company commander (CO) who fixed the morale problem.

"We were, to say at the least, taking our time, as we probed

every metallic signal we picked up over our headsets. Apparently, back in the column, you were getting a little antsy, because our squad leader ... hollered down to us that we were taking too long. My response to him was that I had no problem with stepping back and letting the CO bring his track up to be the first across, but I'll be damned if I was going to say all was clear and climb back on 221 to be the first across (or not). just because some new f*ckin' CO was in a hurry. Needless to say, we finished sweeping at our own pace. No more was said, and no more mines were detected."

The CO replied. "Yes, we were all hollered at for moving too slow. You guys had it easy coming from me. I had to contend with some heavies coming down on me, but I knew the right rate of march and accepted it all. After all, after Joe Rose died, a week later I nearly bought it myself only yards (but off the road)

from where Joe blew up. Lt. Hank Baxter got me to stop my track, having noticed a rubber dish upside down next to our tread. We backed off slowly and blew the damn thing, leaving a crater ten feet deep and nearly 20 feet across. Imagine the mess that would have made, and my wife and mother would have felt bad."

The 2/2 knew this mine-studded location as Bau Bang, the name of a ruined village that still existed only on our maps. I got there in late September. I was a greenhorn captain, newly arrived in Vietnam. Knowing that I had led a mech platoon on a previous tour in Germany, the 2/2's commanding lieutenant colonel — call sign Daring Six — promptly put me in charge of Company C, one of his three combat maneuver elements.

For the next seven-plus months, I was Daring Charlie Six, the radio call sign of the commander of Company C. Our 2/2 Infantry Battalion — radio call sign Daring — had the distinction of being the only mechanized outfit among the ten infantry battalions of the 1st Infantry Division — Call sign Danger. Our battalion packed a particularly heavy punch. The Division made sure to keep us always up to authorized (TO&E) strength.

We rarely visited our rear base in Lai Khe. Home was War Zones C and D between the rivers Song Be and Song Dong Nai on the East and the Michelin Plantation to the West, plus the fields, paddies and hamlets around the Iron Triangle and Lam Son south of Lai Khe. The company spent its nights in its defensive perimeters we hastily built for ourselves or in existing fire bases shared with other units. By day, my three rifle platoons were out with me on the prowl, either mounted or on foot. One might say there was a tacit understanding: We ruled our part of Vietnam in daylight; the VC owned the night.


Lost wars, unresolved conflicts persist in military hearts cemetery 21 Gun Salutes crack the sky with honor while political narratives elicit dismay

When re-exposing myself to battlefields near Saigon the hardest things I came upon were US military assets and bases left behind now under enemy flags

It was as emotionally explosive as when Viet-Cong mortars rained down killing my friends seeing the enemy with our weaponry brought it all back again

In Afghanistan US-led forces prevailed for 20 years including the final days when Soldiers, sailors, and Marines were wounded Afghans were slain and 13 heroes KIA

For many years to come images of Humvees and Blackhawks left in sand will cast over-the-horizon shadows that may flash you back to 9/11/2001 when it all began.

Update: First Division Monument in Washington, D.C.

Our efforts to add the 631 names and their unit (OIF & OND: 439; OEF: 192) to the DC First Division Monument continue.

It's been a slow and agonizing process since the Society board approved the initial design in August 2017. However, thanks to the leadership of LTG Rhame and a DC architectural firm, we are making progress. The House and Senate gave their approval by passing the FIRST ACT legislation. LTG Rhame has worked his way through the first hearings at the

National Park Service (NPS). There will be at least one more session with the NPS before they grant approval for the Society to redesign the monument base, rework the Desert Storm plates, and add all 631 names.

We are hopeful the NPS will grant approval soon but have no projected date. After receiving NPS approval we will issue an RFP for construction bids.

The Monument Fund currently totals \$265,000. We believe, based on similar projects, the cost of our



28th Infantry (Black Lions) Reunion

The 28th Infantry Regiment held their annual reunion in October 2021 in Junction City. Many "Black Lions" made the trip to Kansas as this year was a special year and occasion. Medal of Honor Recipient 2nd Lt. Harold B. "Pinky" Durham, Battery C, 6th Battalion, 15th Artillery was honored during the 1st Infantry Division Big Red One Year of Honor with a street being named after him.

Lt. Harold B. "Pinky" Durham earned his Medal of Honor on October 17, 1967, in the Battle of Ong Thanh, Republic of Vietnam. He was serving as a Second Lieutenant in Battery C, 6th Battalion,

15th Artillery Regiment, 1st Infantry Division. During a firefight on that day, Durham repeatedly exposed himself to hostile fire to direct artillery bombardment, even after being severely wounded. He was killed during the battle and posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor for his actions.

Family members of Pinky were in attendance along with some that served in combat with him.

It was an honor to meet the family, and all the Black Lions and their loved ones who came to Junction City and Fort Riley for this honorable event.






