Letter from the President

A happy, healthy, prosperous 2023 to all of you! I trust you are enjoying spring wherever you may be.

I welcome back to Fort Riley our Commanding General and all the members of the Division Headquarters who have been deployed to Europe the past several months. Well done! They continue to make us proud and have lived up to the Division Motto: No Mission Too Difficult, No Sacrifice Too Great, Duty First!

In this space I'd like to update you on the 2023 Society Reunion, the Society's Washington D.C. Monument additions, and Huebner Scholarships.

2023 Society Reunion, New Orleans, August 9-12. Key "Takeaways":

- ALL BRO veterans are welcome and encouraged to attend the reunion.
- Theme: "1st Infantry Division WW II – N. Africa, Sicily, Normandy, Germany, Czechoslovakia." The WW II Museum is in New Orleans and you should plan to visit.
- Best days to attend are Friday

- and Saturday; arrive Thursday, depart Sunday.
- Seek out Post 9-11 BRO vets and encourage their attendance.
- Advertise the Reunion by posting BRO Reunion Notices in your local VFW and Legion Halls.
- Reunion details are in this BHS
- D.C. Monument Status. We are making progress to add the 631 names of BRO soldiers lost in Post 9-11 operations (Afghanistan: 192; Iraq: 439) and replace the existing plate of DESERT STORM KIA. Key "Takeaways":
- National Park Service (NPS) is close to giving final approval.
- Society hired a reputable company to manage bid process and construction.
- Most of the project should be completed by September 2023
- The McCormick Foundation has provided a \$500,000 Grant for construction. This is in addition to their 50-cent match of every dollar donated.
- Fund status: We estimate the construction will cost about \$950,000. We currently have

- about \$285,000, plus the \$500,000 McCormick Grant. The Society Board of Directors approved borrowing additional funds needed from Society investment accounts. We will continue to raise money to reimburse the accounts.
- The Society will provide further updates via email and social media.

Huebner Scholarships. The Society has added a new category for Trade School Scholarships. Key "Takeaways":

- There is a shortage of skilled trade workers in the United States. Some estimate there will be more than 3 million trade jobs open by 2028.
- While college is important for some, the skilled worker is vital to our way of life. Working in a trade career means learning a valuable skill that can offer less debt, lucrative pay, job stability, and overall good quality of life.
- Starting with 2023 Huebner Awards, we will evaluate "Scholarships" for those eligible for Huebner Scholarships to obtain "Skilled Trade School Certification" in trades such as

- electricians, welders, mechanics, machinists, tool and die makers, and even programmers. The current College Scholarship Award Program will continue.
- Bottom Line: The Society through the First Division Foundation will now include scholarships to those selected for either college or skilled trades schools. See details for applying at the Scholarships Tab under Foundation on the Society website. Scholarship applications are due by May 1.

I continue to be optimistic about the future of our Society. However, each of us must reach out to Post 9-11 BRO veterans to explain our objectives and encourage their participation. They are the future of our Society.

I ask that you continue to keep BIG RED ONE activeduty members in your prayers. They continue to deploy globally, perform outstanding tasks in support of our freedom, and serve as great ambassadors of the United States of America! ■

Society of the First Infantry Division Member Profile Update

Data indicates that Post 9-11 era membership is surpassing the Vietnam era. Given the current composition of our member database, our general fund operates on approximately 5% of member annual dues. Policy for Priority for Attendance at Selected Events

For the 2017 & 2018

Reunion, the Society Board of Directors approved a policy to give priority for attendance at selected events to Society members registered to stay at the Reunion Hotel. We shall continue that Policy for the 2023 Reunion

- 1. Priority for available seats to scheduled events shall go to those paying registration fee and renting rooms at The Astor Crowne Plaza, 739 Canal Street, New Orleans, LA. The Society will make exceptions, on a caseby-case basis for those driving RVs or residing within daily commute distance of the Reunion Hotel. The Society Staff shall adjudicate other special cases.
 - 2. Available tickets will be sold

on a first come, first served basis to those specified in paragraph one above. Ticketed events under this policy include Conflict Breakfast, Banquet, and Tours.

- 3. After the Registration Cut-off date of 10 July 2023, remaining tickets to all events will be sold on a first come basis to those who paid Reunion Registration Fee.
- 4. Society members not registered, not staying at the Astor Crowne Plaza Hotel may attend the Welcome Party, Memorial Service, and the General Membership Meeting.

This policy was established by the Board of Directors in 2017. They have determined it will remain in effect for 2022. ■

Our hotel

The Astor Crowne Plaza is the location for our 102nd Annual Reunion, August 9-13, 2022. Check-in will be at 4:00 pm and check-out is 11:00 am. The hotel address is 739 Canal Street, New Orleans, LA 70130.

Transportation from Airport

Airport Shuttle is available with a round trip discounted rate of \$40 per person (round trip), \$20 per person (one-way) from Louis Armstrong New Orleans International Airport to the hotel. Parking for those who may be driving

Parking is available at the hotel through Premium parking. They offer a safe and secure valet garage at 716 Iberville Street, located behind the Astor Crowne Plaza. Rates are \$20 per night for standard size vehicles with a \$10 surcharge for oversized vehicles (trucks, mini vans and larger).

Or: Hotel Valet parking is available for \$55.22 per day/night (inclusive of all taxes), payable to the hotel once you arrive.

Oversized vehicles may be valet parked for \$66.49 per day/night (inclusive of taxes).

There are alternate parking options within 6 minutes walking distance from the hotel. They are either the Parking Management Services located at 918 Gravier Street (504-566-1000) or Premium Parking Service located at 1010 Commons Street (504-565-5546). You will need to pay for parking at the garage of your choice.

Unit Command Posts

The 2nd, 16th, 18th, 26th/28th Infantries, Artillery, Cavalry/ Armor/Recon and Headquarters & Support Units will operate Command Posts (Hospitality Rooms) for their units. Veterans from units not listed are welcome in any CP. The size of your CP room will be based on how many members from your unit attend. Judging for the CP decorating competition will take place on Friday, August 11, at 1500. The theme for this year's CP competition is 1st Infantry Division, World War II: North Africa - Sicily - Normandy - Germany – Czechoslovakia.

Reunion Registration Fees

Registration, received before July 10, is \$50. Registration received after midnight July 10 is \$65.

NOTE: Reunion registration fees are nonrefundable

The cutoff date to secure your hotel room reservations at our group rate is July 12. We encourage you to register early to take advantage of the Society's special rate! If you make reservations and then need to cancel them, you will not be charged if you cancel 72 hours prior to arrival and a confirmation number is obtained from the hotel. Cancellations made within 72 hours of arrival will be subject to a one night's room and tax cancellation

Weather

Average temperatures in New Orleans in August are in low to mid 90's during the day with the humidity levels close to 100%. Nighttime lows average around 78 degrees, rarely falling below 74. Chances of rain on any given day are relatively high ranging from 60% at the beginning of August to 46% at the end

of August. You might want to pack comfortable, loose-fitting, summery clothes, but remember that Gulf Coasters like to cool their indoor spaces to Arctic levels, so bring a layer of some sort (cardigan, pashmina, light jacket) for restaurants, museums, and other indoor attractions.

Confirmation

You will receive an email confirmation of your registration (if you have email). Pease review it carefully to be sure you signed up for all the activities

and functions you are interested in, as there is limited seating at several events. The banquet sells out quickly, so please sign up for that early. If any activities you are interested in are not on your confirmation then you did not sign up and pay for them. Call us immediately (785-579-6761) to make any corrections or additions to your registration. All registration forms will be available with registration at the reunion site.

Letter from the CG by Major General John V. Meyer, III

Dear Big Red One Soldiers, Families, and Friends,

We are home! The Division Headquarters and DIVARTY redeployed in February after maintaining a division presence in Europe for over 21 months. We are glad to be back at Fort Riley--the best place to live, work, deploy from, and return home to.

Since the last update, the 2nd Brigade deployed to Europe to support our partners and allies. Our Soldiers are focused, trained, and ready to participate in multi-national training exercises to enhance interoperability. 
Scouting Out a Bright Future

World War II

Operation Husky, the invasion of Sicily, occurred on 10 July 1943 in accordance with a decision by the UK and US at the Casablanca Conference in January. Invading Sicily was the means for taking the war to Axis territory in 1943. The Allies had to conclude the campaign in North Africa before they could mount Husky. The end in North Africa came on 12 May 1943, when nearly 275,000 Axis soldiers surrendered at Tunis. Although planning for Husky began soon after the Casablanca conference, some of the units earmarked for the campaign, including the Big Red One, could not prepare until after the Axis surrender.

The 1st Infantry Division (ID) entered combat in WWII when it

landed in Algeria on 8 November 1942. In the ensuing months, the division fought across Algeria and Tunisia. The campaign cost the Big Red One 634 killed in action and 3,916 wounded. These numbers don't include solders injured or killed in non-battle accidents or the hundreds who suffered from malaria.

Not long after taking Oran, General Dwight D. Eisenhower, in command of the Allied Force, ordered the 1st ID into Tunisia piecemeal. Lieutenant General K.A.N. Anderson, who commanded the First British Army, used the division as a fire brigade sending units hither and yon. This left Major General Terry Allen and his staff unemployed and led to misuse of the division. After Kasserine Pass, Eisenhower ordered the division reassembled under Lieutenant George S. Patton Jr. at II Corps. Major General Omar N. Bradley served as Patton's deputy.

Thus, Allen got his division back. He and Brigadier General Teddy Roosevelt led brilliantly at El Guettar. Flamboyant and wildly popular with their troops, both provoked Patton and Bradley. Although Patton and Allen were friends, Patton's vanity and insecurity led him to goad Allen. On one occasion, he urinated in Allen's slit trench and dared him to use it.

Bradley regarded Allen, Roosevelt and the 1st ID as prima donnas. Bradley respected Allen's combat leadership but regarded him as "possibly the most difficult commander I had to handle throughout the war." Allen thought Bradley "a sanctimonious bastard." Despite an unhappy relationship with Bradley and a tempestuous one with Patton, both regarded the 1st ID as first rate and necessary for the success of Husky. Patton, when assigned to command US forces in Sicily, asked Eisenhower for the 1st ID saying, "I want those sons of bitches."

In May, the 1st ID trucked back from Tunisia to Oran to rest, train and integrate replacements. 1st ID veterans had a high opinion themselves, believing

WWI Medal of Honor Recipient Honored

The Society was contacted some time ago in reference to a cemetery grave in Concord, North Carolina. The gravesite belonged to Colonel Samuel I. Parker, a 1st Infantry Division WW1 Medal of Honor recipient who served in K Company, 28th Infantry Regiment. The person said there was only a marker on the ground for Col. Parker and suggested he should honored on a grander scale.

We reached out to our 28th Infantry Regiment (Mike MacDonald) and shared this information. Mike then contacted American Legion Riders Chapter 51 (Concord, NC) and learned a fitting memorial had been put in place.

Research on Col. Parker, visits with family members, and fundraising was conducted by members of Chapter 51. On Veterans Day in 2021, a proper monument was unveiled at Oakwood Cemetery with family and community members present.

Col. Parker's Medal of Honor is located at the First Division Museum at Cantigny Park, Wheaton, IL. ■



Post Office Renamed After BRO Soldier Killed in Iraq

A post office in Placentia, California, has been renamed after a fallen Korean American soldier.

U.S. Army Private First Class Jang Ho Kim died in a roadside bomb explosion in Baghdad on November 13, 2006.

In February 2022, U.S. Rep. Young Kim (R, CA-39) introduced the bill to rename the building. The bill passed, designating the facility as "PFC Jang"

Ho Kim Post Office Building."

Kim immigrated to the U.S. from South Korea in 1990. He graduated from Valencia High School and attended Fullerton College before enlisting in June 2005.

PFC Kim was first stationed in Germany as part of the Army's 26th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Brigade Combat Team, 1st Infantry Division, before deploying to Iraq. ■

they had no peers. They found that Oran, which they had liberated, was overrun with rear area soldiers assigned to the Mediterranean Base Section. These worthies not only wore comfortable Khakis while combat veterans wore woolen uniforms, but also set the rules. This led to a "second liberation" of Oran featuring brawls often started by Big Red One troops and general indiscipline. Although Allen took steps to keep his troops in line, this further exacerbated friction with Bradley.


Even before returning to Algeria the division began absorbing replacements including a group of experienced soldiers brought over from 3rd ID. Walter Ehlers, a combat veteran of 3rd ID, joined the division in March. A year later in Normandy he earned the Medal of Honor.

Replacements arriving from the States joined after weeks in transit. Upon arrival, they soon heard "critiques" or after-action reviews of combat operations in Tunisia.

The division established a "battle school" where veterans and new replacements alike received an orientation on the history and traditions of the 1st ID. Training tasks included "intensive physical conditioning, special instruction in infantry weapons, scouting and patrolling, night combat, and platoon combat exercises." Allied Force Headquarters established centers that taught both amphibious and ground combat operations.

Planning and training occurred simultaneously. The Division provided detailed maps both of the beaches and inland as well as considerable intelligence on the Italian and German defenses along with surprisingly accurate enemy order of battle information. Generally, the Allied Force knew that the Italians would defend the beaches while the Germans provided the bulk of mobile forces inland. By the end of May, a dozen Allied divisions were ready.

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

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Visit Our "65 Years" Special Exhibit!

Saluting Cantigny's 65th anniversary with must-see First Division artifacts and storytelling

Visitors to the First Division Museum at Cantigny Park are about to get an eyeful. A special exhibit called "65 Years," opening May 27 and running through Labor Day, boasts no fewer than 465 artifacts arranged in surprising ways, creating a dynamic visual experience for all who step into the transformed lobby space.

For a sense of drama, the objects are presented in a countdown format starting at 65, a nod to Cantigny Park's 65th anniversary year now in progress. Like the military museum itself, the blockbuster exhibit combines history, storytelling and cuttingedge curation to make a lasting

impression on guests.

Visitors will learn about the original museum, housed in the former horse stable that is now the Cantigny Visitors Center. When opened in 1960, two years after the park, it was called the Cantigny War Memorial Museum of the First Division. The present-day and much larger First Division Museum opened in 1992 and received a major renovation in 2017.

"65 Years" also highlights the museum's leadership and key changes through the years.

"The exhibit is meant to be nostalgic for all the families and guests who have come to the park for generations, as well as a chance to share our deep connection to the First Division and its members," said Jessica Waszak, assistant curator.

That connection begins with Colonel Robert R. McCormick, Cantigny's benefactor, who served in the First Division during World War I. The museum honors his legacy and the service and sacrifice of all military veterans, telling their stories and the story of America's military experience through the lens of the 1st Infantry Division or "Big Red One."

The items in "65 Years" represent the mundane and the

momentous, from boots, helmets and cigarette lighters to heroic patches, medals, and flags. They depict the everyday lives of soldiers while commemorating exceptional lives of service and sacrifice for our country.

Some of the nearly 500 artifacts will be on public display for the first time. The objects are organized in 15 categories, with emphasis on soldiers' personal stories. Underlying the exhibit is the trust that artifact donors extend to the First Division Museum in its role of stewarding precious family memorabilia and narratives.
